

Droimeann Bull helps Hooves4Hospice



The latest addition to the Hooves4Hospice herd is a very special young animal. He is a member of one of Ireland's oldest breeds of cattle that was endangered as recently as the turn of the century. The stronghold of his breed is in the south of the kingdom of Kerry. At school, we all encountered the poem 'An Dromfhionn Donn Dilis' which in English translates as the 'The Faithfull Brown Droimeann'. In the nineteen eighties, a long-lived Droimeann cow affectionately known as 'Big Bertha' enjoyed bovine

celebrity status. Otherwise the breed is not one that many know.

That is changing though. With a view to saving the breed from extinction a number of breeders and enthusiasts began to meet up and with the assistance of the Dept. of Agriculture, Weathebys, the ICBF and Teagasc. Good progress is being made in recent years aimed at preserving this ancient native breed of farm animal. There is now a well organised, active Droimeann Cattle Breeders Society.

The Droimeann Bull donated to H4H was born in February 2019. He is 94% pure (no grain, no doses, no chemicaals and outwintered)

A condition of sale is that the bull is kept for breeding purposes for 12 months.

The Lord Mayor also agreed to help advertise the Cork Lions Club Drive-In Bingo in July with Lion Mary Rose Desmond



Many clubs throughout D133 have been in contact with Sean Olohan in Wicklow and have purchased masks with their own individual club logo.



Covid 19 Update



The Government in the Republic of Ireland has placed Donegal in Level Three under Resilience and Recovery 2020-2021: Plan for Living with Covid 19.

This has been divided into five levels of measures. The current level is Level 2 with Dublin and Donegal in Level 3. The Level 3 for Donegal came into effect from Midnight Friday 25th September and is to remain in place until Friday 16th October when it will be reviewed.

What Level 3 means for Lions:

Social and Family Gathering A maximum of 6 visitors from up to 1 other household. Other setting outside your home or garden No social or family gatherings should take place in other settings

Organised Indoor Gatherings No organised indoor gatherings Organised Outdoor Gatherings These are controlled environments with a named event organiser, owner or manager. For example: outdoor Arts events, training events. Gatherings up to 15 people can take place.

Sports Training Outdoors: training can take place in pods of up to 15 (exemption for professional/elite/inter-county sports/senior club championship). Indoors: Individual training only, no dance or exercise classes. Matches and events No matches or events Gyms, leisure centres and swimming pools; for individual training only These can open with protective measures, taking account of public health advice, including social distancing. measures, taking account of public health advice, including social distancing.

Religious Services Online only. Funerals up to 25 Mourners can attend. Places of worship open for private prayer

All Bars, Restaurants and Cafes Restaurants and cafes (including bars/pubs) may remain open for take-away and delivery and outdoor dining/drinking to a maximum of 15 people. Travel Stay in the County of Donegal and do not travel to Donegal apart from for work, educational and other essential services, if appropriate.


This years peace poster competition theme is 'Peace Through Service'.
